

Glenwood Magazine Description

As given to me by Gary Naylor - I wish I could stop by and visit him sometime. He has an original magazine in his Glenwood. (I seem to recall he had a Glenwood #6 but I didn't write that down in my notes).

Over-all length is 19 ½"

It has four holes ½" to ¾" down from the top lip that are about ¾" diameter.

The bottom flairs out some, it just slides through the top hole. The slots in the top are for the 2 sides where it bolts together. The magazine is suspended from the flange under the top cooking plate.

This magazine fits the 119, the No. 6 and No. 8 Glenwood, even though those three are really different sized stoves.

Gary says the stove runs a nice 24 hours with the magazine in place. You get lazy about opening the door as you fill it from the top but you have to knock the coal down around the magazine once a week or maybe a little more often. Otherwise it starts to build up ash and coal around the magazine and you start to lose the nice heat.

I got Gary's phone number from Tuck. Tuck used to have the molds to cast these, they were made in two identical halves that bolted together. He doesn't do that work anymore, says he's retired. All his molds wore out.

I got Tuck's phone number from Emery at the Antique Stove Hospital.
